Books were not the center of my life as a young reader in school. Getting home and getting outside to play with my friends...now that was life! Nothing in any book could have possibly compared with the real life adventures I found in creeks, fishing holes, forests, and fields of rural Leo – or could it?

I did eventually discover a love of books when I was in grade school and middle school. Treasure Island,

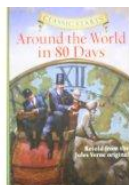


Moby Dick, and Around the World in Eighty Days, were several of the miniaturized and condensed novels I read

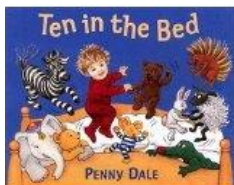


that came with a ten book set of classic novels that my parents bought

me in fourth grade. I kept them as prized possessions and eventually used them as a teacher in my classrooms. Another inspiring episode that might otherwise seem unconnected to reading was my participation in the Boy Scouts. I always eagerly anticipated the arrival of my monthly issue of “Boy’s Life” magazine, with my name on it. I always found something pertaining to adventure, sports, or science in each issue.



In high school, reading exposed me to a larger world and I recall my amazement when reading a high school history book about a city whose roads were rivers. Seeing Venice in person many years later is a testament to the inspirational power a book can have on a young reader.



No matter how influential I thought the aforementioned books were to me, none of them prepared me for the pure joy of sharing the classic short story Ten in the Bed with my two daughters. Seeing the anticipation build on their faces, and hearing the purely joyful laughter

erupt when the zebra goes “Thump!” is more gratifying than I ever imagined any book could be. If you find your young reader isn’t begging for the classic novels of literature in third grade, keep showing him or her the doors of opportunity until his/her “key” fits.

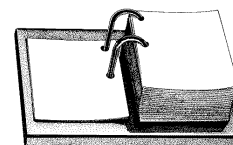
