## ***From the desk of the Principal...***

With the extension of the school day for the month of March, it is probably a good idea to revisit early pick-up and car line procedures. I would anticipate that there may be occasions when more than just our "regular" car riders will not be riding a bus home due to appointments. So, once again, here are procedures that must be followed at the end of the day.

1. We request a note to the teacher and office for early release;
2. If you need to pick your child up from the car line, and do not normally, we will need a note. Buses leave before all cars are run through. There is no way to know that your child will be picked-up without a note. If in question, the child will be sent home on the bus. Sending an e-mailing to a teacher DOES NOT work. There is no guarantee that the teacher will see it before dismissal;
3. A parent must come into the office and sign the child out if leaving prior to dismissal for appointments/pre-arranged activities;
4. Handicap spaces are only for vehicles with handicap stickers;
5. Never allow your child to walk unattended through the parking lot;
6. PLEASE be patient in the car line. We run through the whole cycle of cars in 15-18 minutes regularly. Each person's schedule is important to that individual. Not following the procedures only slows the process down for all;
7. If you are unfamiliar or have not read the car line procedures in your Student-Parent Handbook, the best approach is to just follow what the person ahead of you is doing. Here is a link to the Cedarville Student-Parent Handbook. Pick-up procedures are on pages 7&8.

## ***School Make-up Day Schedule...***

The Board of School Trustees has decided on a plan to make up the 13 days of school we have missed so far this year.

1. Two days were made up in February (Feb. 11 and Feb. 18).

2. One day was waived by the IDOE, leaving ten to make up.
3. Eight days will be added to the end of the school year
4. **Beginning March 3<sup>rd</sup> and extending throughout the month of March**, we will forego teacher collaboration days on Wednesdays (no early dismissal) and add 30 minutes to the end of the school day each day, thus capturing two days.
5. **For Cedarville Elementary, we will be dismissing @ 4:10 M-F during the month of March.**
6. By following this plan, school is currently scheduled to end on Friday, June 6 - Graduation Day.


Please keep in mind that this plan is subject to change based on any additional closings that may occur during the rest of the winter.




### Favorites of Mrs. Roberts, Grade 2:



