From the Desk of the Principal...

Why is reading aloud to your child a top suggestion from reading experts across the country? Studies have shown this activity builds the desire to read - in only 15 or 20 minutes a day?

No matter what your child's reading level, now is a perfect time to start (or continue) reading aloud regularly. Although this topic has been discussed in this section of the newsletter before, here are some additional ideas that are worth noting:

Share the enjoyment. Your child will enjoy the warmth and humor of good books when he/she feels you are enjoying reading, too. Try to find times to read aloud when you aren't rushed or stressed.

Read at a comfortable pace. Lots of people are used to reading books from cover to cover without stopping. It's better to read more slowly, pausing to answer your child's questions and listen to his/her comments.

Look for meaning. As you're reading, ask your child questions, such as, "What's happening on this page?" Once you finish reading, talk about the characters and what happened to them. These talks will help your child understand what's going on in the story.

Build vocabulary. Look for new or unusual words in a story and talk about them. For example, "Curious George was confused. That means he didn't understand. Have you ever been confused?" Then, you can add the new vocabulary word to a special word list.

Although your child may not remember everything about specific books that you read together, memories of the time you spent reading together will last a lifetime!



Thoughts about Homework...

Homework can give parents an opportunity to be involved in their children's education, but helping children with homework isn't always easy. That may explain why the following questions are often heard at parent/teacher conferences:

1. Why do children have homework?

Teachers assign homework for many reasons. Homework can help children:

- review and practice what they've learned;
- get ready for the next day's class;
- practice using resources, such as libraries, reference materials, newspapers, and the internet; and
- explore subjects more fully than time permits in the classroom.

Homework can also help children develop good habits and attitudes. It can:

- encourage self-discipline and responsibility;
- teach children to work independently; and
- encourage a love of learning.

2. Can homework really help my child learn?

Yes, when assignments are meaningful, are completed successfully, and are returned with constructive

comments from the teacher. An assignment should have a specific purpose, come with clear instructions, be fairly well matched to a student's abilities, and designed to help develop a student's knowledge and skills.

Remember to contact your child's teacher if you have questions about homework, or any other concerns.
